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## Background and Methodology

Patrick E. Gonzales graduated magna cum laude from the University of Baltimore with a degree in political science.

His career in the field of public opinion research began in the mid-1980s as an analyst with *Mason-Dixon Opinion Research*. During this time, Mr. Gonzales helped develop, craft and implement election surveys and exit polls for television and radio in the Baltimore-Washington D.C. metro area.

Mr. Gonzales has polled and analyzed thousands of elections in Maryland and across the country over the past forty years. Further, he and his associates have conducted numerous market research projects, crafting message development plans and generating strategy blueprints for businesses and organizations throughout the state.

Over his decades of conducting public opinion polls, Patrick Gonzales has been widely recognized by his peers for his ability to conduct unbiased surveys, and analyze the results in an impartial, evenhanded manner.

Mr. Gonzales appears frequently on radio and television in the Baltimore-D.C. region as a guest commentator.

This poll was conducted by **Gonzales Research & Media Services, Inc.** from December 21<sup>st</sup> through January 6<sup>th</sup>, 2026. A total of 808 registered voters in Maryland, who indicated they are likely to vote in the 2026 general election, were queried by live telephone interviews, utilizing both landline and cell phone numbers. A cross-section of interviews was conducted throughout the state, reflecting general election voting patterns.

The margin of error (MOE), per accepted statistical standards, is a range of plus or minus 3.5 percentage points. If the entire population was surveyed, there is a 95% probability that the true numbers would fall within this range.


## Gonzales Maryland Poll – January 2026 Results

### Maryland General Assembly Review Hospital Pricing

Marylanders express overwhelming support for having the General Assembly review hospital pricing and explore ways to reduce health care costs. With hospital expenses rising more than 250% since 2000—far outpacing inflation—concern about affordability cuts across demographic and political lines. Eight in ten residents (80%) say the legislature should “definitely” take up the issue, and another 14% say it “probably” should. Fewer than 6% express any level of opposition, underscoring how broadly the public views rising hospital costs as a problem requiring state attention.

Support is strong across party registration, though the intensity varies a tad. Democrats show the highest level of certainty, with 83% saying the General Assembly should “definitely” review pricing and another 13% saying it “probably” should. Independent voters mirror this pattern, with 82% in the “definitely” category.

Republicans are somewhat less emphatic but still overwhelmingly supportive overall: 70% say “yes, definitely” and 20% say “yes, probably,” leaving only 8% opposed. The data herein suggest that while partisans may disagree on many health-policy questions, the idea of examining hospital pricing enjoys rare cross-party alignment.
